In addition, they went fishing in the Trondheim fjord on a rainy day and monitored and participated in activities on animal care in the cowshed on our training farm at school.

An important lesson learned was that foreign visitors were not allowed to enter the cowshed or other production areas within forty-eight hours after arriving in Norway. The reason for this is to protect our production animals like cows, pigs and poultry against communicable diseases.

Our guests recognized many routines in working with animals and it became easy to talk about related issues.
